The Covina Colts once again failed to register their first win in the 1955 campaign, but they also failed to lose last Friday's night's game as the Bonita Bear-

cate and the Colts battled to a 0-0 tie. The game was strictly a defensive game, but both teams began to generate their offense in the second half, but couldn't manage to push the pigskin across.

The local eleven still couldn't shake their bad case of fumbles, and once again they gave the ball over to the opponents on fumbles three times. But when they did hand over the pigskin in their own territory, fine defensive work by Roy Hall, Gordy Thompson, Bob Brown and Nifo Lilli called a halt to the numerous invasions.

During the last quarter of the game about half of our student body got up and walked out!

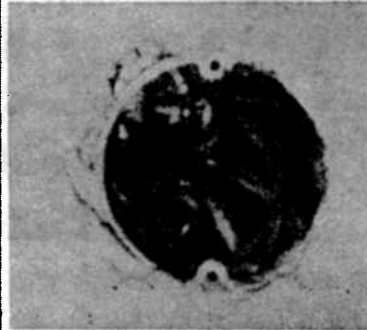

For you students who are planning on continuing your education at some institution of higher learning the article is respectfully dedicated.

San Jose State

Situated in the heart of the city of San Jose is the oldest state educational institution in California; San Jose State College.

The campus is conveniently located near shopping districts and apartment and rooming houses in San Jose. It is within 50 miles of San Francisco and 30 miles of the Pacific Ocean which is separated by the Santa Cruz mountains.

Admission to San Jose will be judged on the basis of A and B grades in 5 or more units in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. Those with A or B grades in 8 or more units will be admitted in clear

standing; those with less than 1 on first probation.

While San Jose State makes definite requirements, the following subjects are recommended: English - 3 units; mathematics - 2 units; modern language (in or language) - 2 units; laborator science (in 3rd or 4th year) - 1 unit; history - 1 unit; and electives - 6 units.

First League Tilt Fatal to Colts as Speedy Montebello Squad Wins

The Covina Colts opened their title defense in the wrong manner on Friday night when they were bested by the Montebello Oilers to the tune of 20-6.

Tish was the loop opener for both teams, and the Colts now occupy the cellar along with their cross town rivals, Baldwin Park. The Braves dropped a 32-0 decision to El Rancho.

The Colts scored with only six seconds remaining in the game, and ruined the hopes of an Oiler shutout. After the host club had scored their third and final touchdown of the game, the locals grabbed the kickoff and with Reed taking to the air lanes the Colts marched down field. He finally faded to find Bob Brown in the end zone and the Colts had chalked up their initial six markers on the scoreboard.

Little Willie DePalma, of the Oilers scored enough points himself to best the Colts, as he crossed the goal stripe twice, and boot-ed the point after touchdown a pair of times.

Fumbles once again proved a costly burden to the Colts, but they only committed two fumbles during the game. Although one was recovered by the Colts, the other bobble came when the locals had penetrated deep into Oiler territory and when they reached the five yard line the fumble was recovered by an Oiler.

Montebello scored in all but the third period, as they held a 14-0 bulge at the half, following a seven pointer in each the first and second periods, and then held

a 20-0 edge when they rallied and scored early in the final stanza.

The Colts shattered the shut-out, the last possible thing they could do at the late time, as they clicked on a 22-yard scoring play from Frank Reed to Bob Brown with six seconds remaining.

The game commenced a five game loop stand for the Colts, as they return home to battle the California Condors this week in their third home appearance. The Condors are rated as one of the top teams in the loop.

Bee's Fall to Oilers Eleven

The Montebello Bee team retained their record of having not been scored against this season as they trounced the Covina Bees, 32 to 0, in the pre-varsity tilt last Friday at Montebello.

Covina booted to start the game and Montebello returned it up to their own 48. Montebello was forced to punt and the Colts took over on the Covina 25. A costly Colt fumble then paved the way for the Oilers first touchdown on a 25 yard pass into the end zone.

In the last minutes of the first quarter Montebello was again goal ward bound as they completed a 40 yard pass to the Covina 27. Picking up where they left off in the first quarter, the Oilers marched to the Colt ten where a five yard strike and run sacked up another six. The try for the extra point was good. Late

The J.V.'s again traveled the road of undefeat as they racked up a 13-0 victory over Montebello this week.

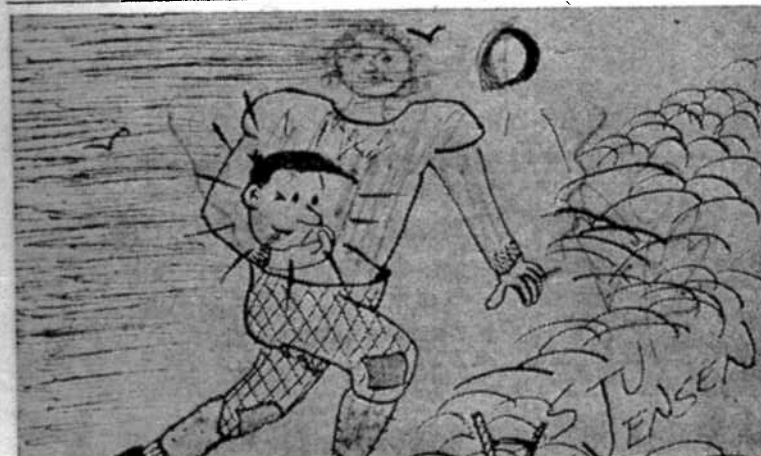

"This week will be a PURPLE SMOG WEEK, which designates heavy smog, medium or light smog, or no smog at all, depending on certain variable factors.

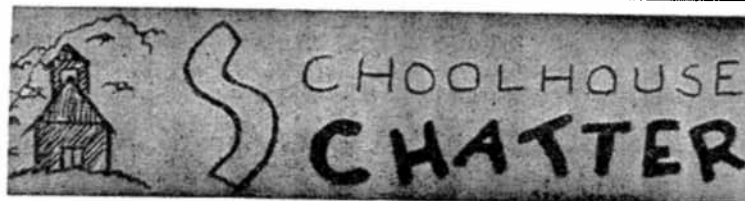
No rubbish is to be burned on campus between 9:00 A.M. and 11:00 A.M. Students are advised to refrain from breathing between

Yes, the students would be allowed to wear these jackets on campus, until Mr. Corbin and the Legislature feel that the case should be reviewed. In arriving at this conclusion, the Legislature felt that they were acting in the best interests of the students of Covina High, whom they represent. The Legislature stated, in presenting their reasons, that since they do not know the future situation of our school, any decision they may make now could be very adequate for the present, but it may prove extremely inadequate for the following years.

In any case, the rule would not go into effect until the following school year.

The Legislature feels and hopes that the students will find this a satisfactory decision.

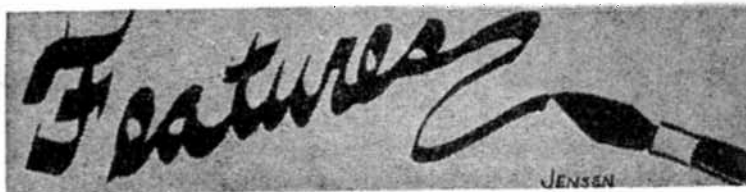
